Some lots are "permit only" parking at all times. If you park in one of these lots you will get a nasty ticket.

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UMUC Marriott

Start at the Conference Center building of the UMUC Marriott. Turn left onto Campus Drive. Go through the traffic circle into Campus. Bare left (at Preinkert Drive) continuing on Campus Drive.



Art-Sociology Building and Art Gallery: The Art Gallery

The Art Gallery was founded in 1966 and housed initially in the Tawes Fine Arts Center. In 1976, the Gallery moved to the Art-Sociology Building. Five to eight exhibitions are produced each year, often accompanied by catalogues, lectures, gallery talks, and panel discussions.



Park in Union Lane Garage or Parking lot by Bus Lane Next to Health Center.Explore stops 3 - 9.

Cole Student Activities Building Cole Field House

Constructed in 1955 and named for Judge William P. Cole, Jr., Class of 1910, the building is commonly referred to Field House." The Terps defeated the University of Virginia in both the first (December 2, 1955) and last (March 3, 2002) games in Cole Field House. Overall, 13 men's All-Americans and 4 women's All-Americans have played at Cole. Maryland men's basketball remained undefeated at Cole during its last season and went on to win the National Championship.

Driskell Center

The David C. Driskell Center for the Study of the African Diaspora, is named in honor of the preeminent artist and art historian as well as beloved teacher and scholar, who taught at the University for 21 years. Following Driskell's example, the Center will provide future generations of students, faculty, and scholars from around the world a unique opportunity to study Africa and the African Diaspora from multidisciplinary perspectives, particularly arts, languages, literature, and history.

Jim Henson Statue and Memorial Garden:

The University of Maryland dedicated the statue of Jim Henson, 1960 graduate of the University of Maryland, conversing with Kermit the Frog and the memorial garden which surrounds it, outside the Adele H. Stamp Student Union

Bioscience Research Building

Hornbake Library and Plaza

"Night-Day" Sculpture

This sculpture resembling Stonehenge was sculpted by Kenneth Campbell, art professor emeritus, who taught stone carving for 15 years.

McKeldin Library

The largest of the seven libraries on campus.

Testudo Sculpture- McKeldin Liburary Bronze Testudo sculptures preside over our campus, and the act of rubbing his nose for good luck is our most-enduring tradition, going strong since 1933!

► There are 5 Testudo Sculptures on Campus. If you find them all you'll get 5 times the luck.



McKeldin Mall ODK Fountain and Sundial

McKeldin Mall is a nine-acre area from Main Administration to McKeldin Library; it originally continued to Anne Arundel Hall and was considered to be the largest academic mall in the country. The center of the Mall features the Omicron Delta Kappa honor society fountain honoring members of the campus chapter of the Omicron Delta Kappa honor society. Each fountain tier represents one of the leadership qualities found in ODK members. Engravings around the fountain include quotations from Franklin Delano Roosevelt and Martin Luther King, Jr.

Peace Garden

The garden was created in 2003 to honor the memory of the victims of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. The garden, located at the east end of McKeldin Mall near Main Administration, marks the spot where the flowers placed along the ODK fountain during the campus' memorial service on September 12, 2001, were buried.

Leave Parking Lot and drive down Campus Drive and turn right onto Regents Drive (at M circle). Parking available just past Chapel.



"M" Circle

The traffic circle on Campus Drive features the shape of an "M". The "M" was created in 1976 to commemorate the bicentennial of the founding of the United States.

Memorial Chapel

Memorial Chapel is one of the university's most visible icons but its role as a memorial and the history behind it is what makes it a very special landmark. It was constructed in 1952 to honor the men and women from the university who lost their lives during the country's wars. Designed by Henry Powell Hopkins, the building consists of three chapels: the Main Chapel, the West Chapel, and the Chapel of the Blessed Sacrament.



Continue down Regents Drive to Light. Turn left onto Route 1. At second light turn into Visitor's Parking lot.

Fraternity Row

Former site of the Phi Sigma Kappa Chapter House, #7; and, future site of Eta Chapter House.



Visitor's Center "The Freshman"

One of eight "Fear the Turtle" sculptures on display around the campus decorated by local artists as part of the university's 150th anniversary celebration. See if you can find all eight that are on campus.

The Dairy

Located in Turner Hall on Route 1, next to the Visitor Center, The Dairy features the famous University of Maryland Dairy ice cream, made-to-order deli sandwiches, hamburgers, sandwiches, Freschetta® Pizza, prepared wraps, salads, sushi, freshly prepared soups, french fries, and chicken tenders.

The Rossborough Inn

Built between 1804-1812, the building along with 428 acres was sold by Charles Benedict Calvert to help found what was then called the Maryland Agricultural College.



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Leave Visitor's Center Lot and turn left onto Route 1. Go to next light and turn left on Campus Drive, back into Campus. Take first right onto Paint Branch Drive

Turn left onto Regants Drive. Park in Lot #9. Explore stops 17 - 19.

Field Hockey and Lacrosse Complex

Comcast Center

The Comcast Center athletic arena opened in the fall of 2002 and replaced Cole Field House as the College Park venue for Maryland basketball. Comcast Center has a seating capacity of 17,950. An additional 1,500-seat gymnasium serves as home to the Terps' volleyball, gymnastics, and wrestling teams. Visitors can learn about the men and women who have placed the Maryland Athletics program among the nation's elite as they stroll through the Terrapin Walk of Fame and History. The National championship trophies for the men's (2002) and women's (2006) basketball teams are also housed, and can be viewed, at the Center.



Rain Gardens

Engineered combination of plants, soils and mulch designed to collect, retain and cleanse rainwater that runs off parking lots.



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Leave Lot 9 continuing on Regents Drive. Turn right past Barns, onto Farm Drive. Follow all the way to the traffic circle.



Campus Farm

Cambridge Community Dormitories that house 1,500 students.

Eppley Recreation Center

ERC houses indoor and outdoor swimming pools, fitness machines, squash courts, a running track and an outdoor climbing wall and ropes course



The Diner:

One of two campus dining halls.



Turn right on Stadium Drive go to light. Go straight into Golf course.

University of Maryland Golf Course 18 hole course and Clubhouse. Mulligan's Bar and Grill for fine, light fare.



Retrace route back to Stadium Drive. Enter Campus and go to traffic circle and turn right onto Valley Drive. Park in Lot Z or 1 to explore stops 24 - 30

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Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center The Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center is the largest single building ever constructed by the State of Maryland. The 318,000square-foot performing arts center, designed by Moore Ruble Yudell, is located on 17 acres at the northwest end of campus. A state of the art performing arts "village," comprised of 10 interconnected structures, the Center celebrated its official dedication on September 29, 2001. The center is named for a well-known Virginia artist and collector, Clarice Smith, who attended the university before continuing her art studies at the Corcoran School and at Geo. Washington University, where she taught watercolor and portrait painting to advanced degree candidates. Smith has had numerous solo exhibitions in galleries in the United States and abroad. Together with her husband, real estate developer Robert Smith, the Smiths have become the largest private donors ever to a public university in the State of Maryland.



Samuel Riggs IV Alumni Center & Moxley Gardens

The Phillip R. Rever Alumni Hall of Fame at the Samuel Riggs IV Alumni Center was named after Class of 1964 graduate Philip Rever, whose efforts as a member of the center's development committee transformed the hall from an architect's drawing into a three-dimensional tribute to Maryland's most famous graduates. The hall is located outside Orem Alumni Hall on the center's first floor.

Moxley Gardens present peaceful gardens surrounded by decorative iron fence and Brick Gate Posts. Each Post carries the letters of the Fraternity or Sorority that sponsored the construction. Find the two Posts with the letters; "Phi Sigma Kappa".



Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium

Byrd Stadium is the home of the Maryland Terrapins football and lacrosse teams. The facility is named after former university president Harry "Curley" Byrd. Adjacent to the Stadium is Gossett Football Team House, Stop in to see the Athletics Hall of Fame Displays.

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Drive to end of Lot 1 (towards Campus Drive). Go Straight through traffic circle onto Mowatt Lane. Follow to intersection with Knox Road and turn left onto Preinkert Drive. Turn left onto Campus Drive and follow back to UMUC Marriott.




